We aim to leverage technology and innovation to overcome the teacher shortage and subpar quality of education through our digital education programs. We offer standardized classes and learning aids to young minds, ensuring a transformative learning experience.

Our remote Digital Classrooms allow our Volunteer Teachers to deliver consistent top-quality education to the students. The Digital Classroom Program offers them the best learning aids and lesson plans to maximize their learning experience.

The Digital School Program helps us overcome the technological divide and reach every student. From the eVidyaloka Learning App to conventional worksheets and workbooks to the Teach Through Television program, this multi-mode system makes education accessible to all.



Why?

Most government schools in rural India face one or more of the following issues:



Lack of infrastructure

Most schools lack basic facilities and adequate classrooms, which makes it difficult for students to focus on their studies. The lack of access to the internet makes it difficult for students to access online learning resources and keep up with their urban counterparts.



Shortage of Qualified Teachers

Rural areas often face a shortage, and many teachers are not adequately trained to teach in rural schools. More than the shortage of teachers, the deployment of teachers is another significant area of concern.



Language barrier

In many rural areas, students speak their local dialect, which differs from the language of instruction. This language barrier can make it challenging for students to learn and understand.

Set up infrastructure for Digital Classes in each school with a designated classroom, Class Assistant and Field Co-ordinator.






Assign qualified volunteer teachers online to these classrooms and run the classes as per an agreed schedule.

During the AY 2022–23, we worked alongside 5,562 volunteers across 300+ cities which included both Corporate volunteers and Individuals. They delivered quality teaching to remote and rural government school students through our online learning programs.

Sandeep, a 7th grade student along with his team created a model on Photosynthesis. Many such models to present at the event.

created a model on Photosynthesis. Many such models from different Government schools were collected and submitted. The Photosynthesis model which our Viboothipura students created was selected as one of the top 10 models.

During the Prize distribution the judges asked the students how you got this idea of creating a model about Photosynthesis. Sandeep answered with excitement "Nagarjuna sir - an eVidyaloka Volunteer teacher, showed us videos and pictures and explained to us the details about Photosynthesis. This is how we were able to make this model, we thank eVidyaloka and Nagarjuna sir for these Online Digital Classes."



Volunteering models like the Digital Classroom Program and the Teach Through Television Program allowed us to complement a traditional classroom teacher and reach every student in need. Throughout the year, our team and volunteers worked diligently to bridge the education gap and uplift the lives of children by leveraging technology and the power of volunteering.

Our volunteers, hailing from diverse backgrounds and enriched with a vast array of competent skills, became positive role models and motivators for students. Their presence contributed to higher school attendance, improved learning, less misbehavior, and better social skills beyond textbooks and curriculum.

In addition to the online teaching model, volunteers compiled comprehensive study materials in regional languages for students of classes 5th to 8th per their respective State Board curriculum.

These study materials helped children have an enriched and enhanced learning experience. Having partnered with 45+ Corporates and having a number of dedicated individuals working with us during the last annual year, we have achieved an enabling environment for volunteers to have a smooth transition and to get positioned as teachers.

Volunteers play a crucial role in helping schools enhance equity of opportunity by addressing learning barriers and re-engaging with students who may be disconnected from formal education.

Donors

Donors are the fuel of eVidyaloka that keeps us geared and running. Their generous contributions allow us to meet our requirements and work collaboratively with our partners, teacher volunteers and community leaders in our journey to provide education and learning opportunities to children across the nation.

In AY 2022-23, we received support from 29 Corporates, 512 Individuals and FCRA entities with 60% matching grants.

Our Digital Classroom Program also reached new locations, including **Odisha, Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh**.

eVidyaloka also piloted 3-year partnerships with a few corporates.





Digital Classroom Program

After the pandemic, when everyone was busy settling into the new normal of online classes and remote learning, we were perfecting the way we did it.



Our foundational program was and is mainly connecting passionate Volunteer Teachers with children from rural areas via digital technology. The major issue we faced all along was connectivity and we found ways to combat that.



We urged students to come back to school to their refurbished Digital Classrooms, which have been set up with the required infrastructure which includes a large monitor, webcam, mic, speakers, a computer system/laptop to connect online, and better internet connections. This ensures a seamless connect while live interactive sessions take place.






Teach Through Television



In order to cater to students who are not able to access our Digital Classrooms, we curate video lessons and broadcast them in regional languages via local cable channels through our Teach Through Television program. This helped students who were not enrolled with us to also learn from a more accessible medium.



We identified and created resources with the help of volunteers and Subject Matter Experts. These videos supported virtual learning for our rural children. Our Teach Through Television Program airs grade-level appropriate videos that are structured around the 5 E pedagogy of teaching and learning.

Our Volunteers mentored the students of Grade 12 APSWREIS in preparation for the NEET and IIT competitive exams.

The tenure of the program was for 4 months. We had 254 students enrolled for JEE and 241 for NEET coaching. It started on 26th October 2022 and ended in the first week of February 2023. These sessions happened after the students' school timings i.e., between 7 and 9 pm in the evening.

The inspiring stories of two of our alumni were presented and the former students were brought on stage – Rohit from Jharkhand and Suma from Karnataka.



"My name is Rohit Kumar Verma and this is my story. Back when I was in grade 5 when I stepped into an eVidyaloka class, I didn't know that I was stepping into a world of possibilities. It was Rajlaxmi madam who ignited the spark within me. She recognized the potential in a group of us and decided to start a special batch for LC (Leadership Curriculum) classes, with just six students. In those sessions, we delved deep into the art of dream-chasing and learned how to translate our aspirations into reality.

The turning point arrived when I was selected to present at RUBARU 2018. The excitement was palpable as I boarded an airplane for the very first time, making my way to Bangalore. There, on a stage, I stood tall and spoke passionately about my dream – a dream of becoming an Engineer. The feeling of sharing my aspirations with an audience was exhilarating, and I knew I was on the right path.

As time passed, my connection with eVidyaloka grew stronger. During my grade 10, I was granted special mentorship by eVidyaloka teachers. Besides helping me ace my board exams, this experience helped me cultivate a holistic approach to thinking. Wisdom was imparted in those sessions that went beyond textbooks.

In the year 2020, I proudly completed my 10th grade with an 79.40 percent. And in 2022, I cleared my 12th-grade exams, securing 81 percent. I ventured into the world of competitive exams, participating in the WBJEE exam and securing a rank of 10427. This achievement earned me a seat at the esteemed Meghnath Saha Institute of Technology in Kolkata through WBJEE.

What warms my heart even more is that my connection with eVidyaloka endures. I remain in touch with many of my eVidyaloka teachers. Their happiness and pride in my achievements stand as a testament to the impact eVidyaloka has had on my life. From a dreamer to an engineer-in-the-making, my journey has been an embodiment of the power of education and unwavering support."







Suma hails from Bogur, a small village in Dharwad district in Karnataka. She is an alumnus of the Government High School, Bogur. Suma comes from an agricultural background. Her father, Sadanand is a farmer and her mother Shashikala is a housewife. They are the backbone of her success.

eVidyaloka started its virtual classroom program in 2017 in this school with the help of our on-ground partner, Vidya Poshak.

Suma was in Class 7 when she participated in The Raman Young Science Innovator Award. We are proud to tell you that in 2019 Suma was the only student, registered from a Government school who got short-listed, from across the country. Suma created a Human Heart model and explained it very well to the judges and the other participants. She was mentored by our volunteer Ms. Jaipriya.

Suma is the perfect example and an exemplary role model for all the students to dream beyond the walls, persevere relentlessly, and achieve their dreams.

Today, Suma is studying in 1st year of PUC at a college in Dharwad, and eVidyaloka had the opportunity to bring her on stage during our Annual RUBARU event in 2023 to share about her experience and journey.

















ROSHNI 2022 NATIONAL PARTNER SUMMIT



eVidyaloka's National Partner Summit brought together over 400 NGOs across 14 states involved in providing education to rural students. This event aims to unite all our partners and like-minded organisations to share experience, expertise, and best practices to effectively achieve the vision of educating rural children in India. It was conducted virtually on August 26 2022, with the "Azadi Ki Amrit Mahotsav" theme. It hosted Mr Amitabh Kant, former CEO of Niti Aayog and India's new G20 Sherpa, as the chief guest.



In this address, Mr Kant said, "eVidyaloka has truly empowered the vision of "padne likhne ki azadi" and has made education available to all. The model promotes quality learning and addresses the issue of the shortage of teachers by mobilising volunteers across the country and Indians worldwide. The imprint of eVidyaloka is commendable both inside and after school."

Mr Kant further remarked that change must be driven at the grassroots level, and eVidyaloka and its partners have been effectively going through this change and impact. "It is a remarkable digital convergence story contributing to Atma Nirbar Bharat. It's a great model for engaging partners to reach the last mile learners," he lauded.







This year, NSIC Season 6 was conducted in 2 phases. We received over 400 PAN-India registrations from students across different schools, states, and backgrounds. They worked on various problem statements derived from the UNSDGs, mainly around the Eradication of Poverty, Good Health and wellbeing, Clean Water and sanitation, and Responsible Consumption and production. The students worked remotely under the able guidance of their assigned volunteer mentors for ten weeks.

A total of 52 teams were shortlisted for Phase 2, where the teams were merged to create 26 groups based on common UNSDGs. These teams then unified their solutions and presented their final groundwork to the jury members from the LTIMindtree Senior Management and other renowned individuals at the grand finale on 15th and 16th February 2023 at LTIMindtree Campus, Bangalore.

Nikhil Khare and Yash Khare, from Z.P.P. Bhorwadi School, Ahmednagar, Maharashtra, participated in the National Students Innovation Challenge (NSIC) under the mentorship of Sameer Apte. Their team GYAN AMRIT EDU STARS, focused on quality education.



Post evaluation based on the 4l's: impression, impact, innovation and implementability, six teams were declared the winners across different categories. The winners also received a cash price of 15k per student in the winning teams and 5k per student in the special award teams.

Yoga Day, Independence Day, Teachers' Day, Childrens' Day, Farmer's Day, Math Day and more.





SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES & NOTES TO ACCOUNTS

The Trust was formed on 28th of January 2011, the Founders being Mr.Venkataramanan Sriraman and Mr.Satish Viswanathan were desirous of establishing a Public Educational Trust with the objects, terms and conditions agreed upon. The Trust is a Public Educational and Chantable Trust. The Trust is Registered under section 12AA of Income Tax Act 1961 vide Reg No. DIT(E)BLY/12A/E-153/AAATE4036C/TO(2-1/Vol2012-13 dated 30th October, 2012 and renewed vide Reg No AAATE4036CE20214 dtd 28-05-2021 and also The Trust is Registered under section 80G(5)(vi) vide Reg No. DIT(E)BLR/80G/278/AAATE4036C/ITO (E) -1/Vol 2012-2013 dated 30th October, 2012 and renewed vide Reg No AAATE4036CF02014 dtd 28-05-2021.

The objects of the Trust are to promote the cause of Education by establishing centres at various parts of India and by imparting vocational training and skill development training through web based teaching.

1. Statement on Significant Accounting Policies

i) Basis of Accounting and Preparation of Financial Statements:

The financial statements are prepared under historical cost convention, accrual basis of accounting and in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in India and comply with applicable accounting standards issued by Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI).

ii) Income Recognition

Grants received during the year is taken to the Statement of Income and Expenditure.

The Grants unutilised as at the beginning of the year is brought forward to the Statement of Income and Expenditure.

The Grant unutilised as at the end of the year is transferred and carried in the Balance Sheet.

Donations received in kind during the year are measured and recognised at fair value as per independent valuation report.

Donations received towards specified purpose shall be treated as an earmarked fund and the utilisations during the year shall be recognised in the statement of Income and Expenditure.

Other general donations received shall be recognised directly in the statement of Income and Expenditure in the year of receipt.

Interest on Investments and deposits are recognized on a time proportion basis.

iii) Property, Plant and Equipment and Intangible Assets and Depreciation

Property, Plant & Equipment are stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses if any. Cost comprises the purchase price and any attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use. Property, Plant & Equipment received as Donation in kind are measured and recognised at fair value on the date of being ready for their intended use.

Intangible Assets are recorded at the consideration paid for acquisition of such assets and are carried at cost less accumulated amortisation. Depreciation is provided on a Written-down Value Method (WDV) based on the rates prescribed under the Income Tax Act, 1961.

iv) Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the Trust has a present obligation as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate of the amount can be made.







SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES & NOTES TO ACCOUNTS

Current tax is determined on the basis of the Income Tax Act, 1961. The income of the Trust is exempted as per the provisions of sections 11 to 13 of the Income Tax Act 1961.

The Trust is a non-profit organisation and does not expect any taxable income and hence Deferred tax will be considered for recognition as and when it arises.

vi) Retirement & Other Benefits

- a. Provident Fund: The Trust contributes to the Employees' Provident Fund Scheme maintained by the Central Government through the Regional Provident Fund Commissioner. Contributions to Provident Fund is made at pre-determined rates and charged to the statement of Income and Expenditure. The Trust's liability is limited to the extent of contributions made.
- b. Employee State Insurance: The Trust's contribution to the Employee State Insurance Fund is charged to the statement of Income and
- c. Gratuity: Liability on account of gratuity of employees as at the balance sheet date is determined based on actuarial valuation. Adequacy of the charge will thereafter be determined and provided for in the books on the basis of an independent actuarial valuation done annually at the balance sheet date.
- d. Leave Encashment: Provision has been made in the books based on the leave balance as at the end of the financial year as per the policy.

1A. Change in Accounting Treatment

There is change in Accounting treatment of utilisation of Grants in the Statement of Income and Expenditure during the year compared to There is change in Accounting treatment of unisation of crants in the seatment of unicome and expenditure unique are view for permitted and present the company of the earlier years. In the earlier years, are frants utilisations including capital expenditure incurred towards acquiring/purchasing capital assets for promoting/imparting digital education/training to the enrolled education centres (schools) were entirely charged off as Project - Digital Classroom Program-Capiex in the Statement of Income and Expenditure in the respective years. Further, in the earlier years, a separate Assets fund was set aside from Statement of Income and Expenditure in the respective years. Further, in the earlier years, a separate Assets fund was set aside from Statement of Income and Expenditure and disclosed separately under further funds for capital expenditure incurred for development of collaborative digital Platform towards stakeholders management for contributing donations by donors, enrolment of partners, education centres, Volunteer teaching faculties and for scheduling and monitoring online course sessions and tracking Class Assistants attendance.

However, during the current financial year, Trust Management decided to change the Accounting treatment with respect to Grants Accounting. The Capital expenditure utilised from the Grants is now directly taken to Fixed Assets without routing through statement of Income and Expenditure. Consequently, assets fund is not created for such capital expenditure and the balance in the assets fund is transferred to Reserves and Surplus during the current financial year.

Financial impact consequent to change in Accounting Treatment

Consequent to the above change, Fixed Assets and Surplus is more to the extent of Rs. 1,33,47,095 /- during the current financial year.
